POLICE OFFICER ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

PERFORMING POLICE OFFICER DUTIES

- 1. Drive motor vehicle under non-emergency conditions.
- 2. Search persons, vehicles and places.
- 3. Drive motor vehicle under emergency circumstances.
- 4. Respond to calls.
- 5. Patrol assigned area in a vehicle.
- 6. Transport prisoners.
- 7. Make checks of various types of premises.
- 8. Check condition/status of assigned patrol equipment.
- 9. Warn offenders in lieu of arrest or citation.
- 10. Administer first aid.
- 11. Assist elderly or disabled persons or individuals in need of similar assistance.
- 12. Evacuate persons from dangerous area.
- 13. Make arrests.
- 14. Issue citations for non-traffic offenses.

Other Important Patrol Functions

- 1. Escort vehicles or persons.
- 2. Respond to and resolve animal complaints.
- 3. Advise vehicle owners to remove abandoned vehicles.
- 4. Patrol assigned area on foot.
- 5. Check businesses for compliance with licensing requirements.
- 6. Handle canines.

ESSENTIAL TRAFFIC FUNCTIONS

- 1. Enforce traffic and parking laws and ordinances.
- 2. Investigate traffic accidents and aid the injured.
- 3. Request emergency assistance for accident.
- 4. Locate witnesses to accidents.
- 5. Identify owner of vehicle involved in accident.
- 6. Issue parking or traffic citations.
- 7. Administer roadside sobriety test.
- 8. Follow suspicious vehicles.
- 9. Check vehicles for proper registration.
- 10. Control, regulate & direct traffic, vehicular and pedestrian.
- 11. Operate breathalyzer test apparatus.
- 12. Collect physical evidence from accident scenes.
- 13. Assist stranded motorist.
- 14. Direct traffic using barriers, flares, and hand signals.
- 15. Arrange for obtaining blood/urine samples for sobriety test.
- 16. Measure skid marks.
- 17. Remove hazards from roadway.

Other Important Traffic Functions

- 1. Plan traffic patrol tactics.
- 2. Manually push a stalled motor vehicle with or without assistance.

ESSENTIAL ARREST/APPREHENSION FUNCTIONS

- 1. Identify and apprehend offenders.
- 2. Handcuff suspects or prisoners.
- 3. Conduct frisk and pat down.
- 4. Advise persons of constitutional rights.
- 5. Seize contraband.
- 6. Use deadly force when necessary.
- 7. Fire weapons on duty.
- 8. Pursue suspect in vehicle.
- 9. Pursue suspect on foot.
- 10. Check welfare and maintain security of prisoners.
- 11. Detain prisoners for temporary holding purposes.
- 12. Accompany prisoners to their arraignments.

Other Important Arrest/Apprehension Functions

- 1. Participate in raids.
- 2. Check individual making bond for wants or warrants.
- 3. Fingerprint suspect.
- 4. Organize and conduct photo or station-house lineups.

ESSENTIAL PHYSICAL FUNCTIONS

- 1. Sit for long periods of time.
- 2. Clean and inspect weapons.
- 3. Maintain target practice skills, including the standards necessary to maintain qualification.
- 4. Subdue and arrest a resisting/attacking individual.
- 5. Encounter resistance during an arrest or in an emergency.
- 6. Sit or stand for long periods of time.
- 7. Encounter an armed suspect.
- 8. Wear bulky equipment.
- 9. Recover weapon from suspect who gives it up voluntarily.
- 10. Walk up and down flights of stairs.
- 11. Stand for long periods of time.
- 12. Perform an evasive maneuver to recover weapon from suspect.
- 13. Wear a protective vest.
- 14. Run fast for a short period of time to apprehend a suspect.
- 15. Run to person requiring emergency assistance.
- 16. Climb over obstacles such as fences, shrubs, ditches.
- 17. Run a distance of under 50 yards.
- 18. Walk for long periods of time.
- 19. Climb over obstacles lower than six feet.
- 20. Lift, pick up, and/or carry injured/deceased person.

Other Important Physical Functions

- 1. Run a distance of over 50 yards.
- 2. Jump down from elevated surfaces.
- 3. Force entry into buildings.
- 4. Pull self up over obstacles.
- 5. Lift, pick up and/or carry heavy objects or equipment.
- 6. Pull self through openings.
- 7. Climb through small openings (e.g., windows).
- 8. Physically push large/heavy objects.
- 9. Drag injured/deceased person.
- 10. Crawl in confined areas (e.g. attics).
- 11. Run for a long period of time.
- 12. Carry an unconscious person unassisted.

ESSENTIAL INVESTIGATIVE FUNCTIONS

- 1. Investigate crimes against persons and property.
- 2. Collect and preserve evidence.
- 3. Investigate suspicious persons or vehicles.
- 4. Locate witnesses to crime.
- 5. Investigate accidents.
- 6. Search crime scenes for physical evidence.
- 7. Search premises or property.
- 8. Secure accident, crime, and disaster scenes.
- 9. Interrogate suspects.
- 10. Make judgments re: probable cause for warrantless searches.
- 11. Document chain of custody of evidence.
- 12. Search for missing people.
- 13. Diagram crime and accident scenes.
- 14. Transport property or evidence.
- 15. Review information on criminal and traffic activity in area and roll call information.
- 16. Recover and inventory stolen property.
- 17. Investigate complaints of drug law violations.
- 18. Check stolen status on property through computer network.
- 19. Estimate value of stolen or recovered goods.
- 20. Process crime scene, fingerprints, accident scene, etc.
- 21. Conduct surveillance of individuals/locations.

Other Important Investigative Functions

- 1. Trace stolen goods.
- 2. Review crime lab reports, records to aid investigation.
- 3. Examine dead bodies.

ESSENTIAL COMMUNICATIONS FUNCTIONS

- 1. Interact and work with citizens.
- 2. Provide accurate oral descriptions.
- 3. Talk with people to establish rapport.
- 4. Explain complaints to offenders, victims, witnesses.

- 5. Exchange information with other law enforcement officials.
- 6. Participate in meetings with other officers (roll call).
- 7. Mediate family disputes.
- 8. Conduct interviews.
- 9. Comfort emotionally upset persons.
- 10. Advise victims, witnesses and offenders on legal procedures.
- 11. Refer persons to agencies providing social services.
- 12. Contact higher-level supervisors regarding problems.

Other Important Communications Functions

- 1. Conduct parent-juvenile conferences.
- 2. Contact lower level supervisors regarding problems.
- 3. Make presentations to groups.

ESSENTIAL COMMUNITY/PUBLIC RELATIONS FUNCTIONS

1. Use knowledge of community resources (e.g., detox).

ESSENTIAL ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

- 1. Determine whether incidents are criminal or civil matters.
- 2. Make judgments re: arrest/release of suspects/offenders.
- 3. Serve subpoenas and search/arrest warrants.
- 4. Place children in protective custody.

Other Important Administrative Functions

- 1. Conduct or supervise searches of property.
- 2. Inform other units of major incidents.
- 3. Request assistance from other agencies.
- 4. Deal with barricade/hostage situations.
- 5. Direct assisting officers or public service personnel.

ESSENTIAL STRESS-RELATED FUNCTIONS

- 1. Work in a highly stressful and emotional environment and remain calm and in control.
- 2. Cope with the stress that the job creates for family life.
- 3. Handle stress of being highly visible as an officer and being held to a higher standard of conduct.
- 4. Handle stress of violent situations.
- 5. Deal with the strain of the work shift.
- 6. Cope with stress from responding to many service calls.
- 7. Handle stress of traumatic incidents.
- 8. Handle stress created from witnessing domestic conflicts.
- 9. Adjust to rotating shift assignments, work holidays, etc.
- 10. Handle stress from responsibility of carrying a weapon.

Other Important Stress-Related Functions

1. Handle stress associated with high profile cases.

ESSENTIAL HAZARDOUS FUNCTIONS

- 1. Use proper equipment when dealing with blood borne diseases.
- 2. Deal with people afflicted with blood borne diseases (HIV).
- 3. Handle contaminated evidence (blood, needles, etc.).

Other Important Hazardous Functions

- 1. Administer first aid to subjects with blood borne diseases.
- 2. Be exposed to hazardous materials, smoke inhalation, etc.
